

General Highlights

Say on Sustainability: is it an effective tool?

The Annual General Meeting (AGM) is the main forum for engagement between companies and their shareholders. For companies and their boards, it's a platform to communicate their performance, vision and strategy and build investor confidence. For shareholders, it's an opportunity to use their rights and make their voice heard by voting on key matters such as director elections, the auditor's appointment and executive remuneration.

In recent years, the nature of engagement between companies and their investors has changed and shifted in focus. An increasing part of the dialogue – both before, during, as well as after the AGM – is focused on sustainability performance and how well the company manages material environmental, social and governance (ESG) risks and opportunities. Yet, most AGM agendas seem disconnected from this new reality, as they fail to include a key item – a resolution to approve the company's sustainability reporting.

The state of play

Investors are facing regulations that increasingly require ESG factors are integrated into investment and stewardship decisions, as well as in their reporting to clients and beneficiaries. Concurrently, other stakeholder groups such as customers, suppliers, non-governmental organizations and civil society have an increasing interest in non-financial information.

Against this backdrop, many jurisdictions have adopted mandatory requirements for companies to report sustainability information. For example, companies subject to the European Union's Corporate Reporting Sustainability Directive (CSRD) will have to soon file information according to European Sustainability Reporting Standards (ESRS).

Despite these developments, giving shareholders a vote on the company's ESG reporting remains an exception rather than the rule. We see this in Spain, where large companies have been required to include proposals to approve their 'non-financial' reporting on the agenda of their AGMs since 2019. More recently, Swiss listed companies were for the first time required to submit their 'non-financial' reporting for shareholder approval in 2024. Looking beyond these exceptions, however, most AGM agendas include no item to approve the company's sustainability report.

The case for change

Today, it is commonplace for shareholders to have a separate vote on a company's remuneration approach via the 'Say on Pay' proposal. This has been a helpful tool to promote accountability for remuneration policies and practices. Some companies have even moved to include 'Say on Climate' proposals on their agendas in recent years to gauge investor views on their climate strategy. This has served to increase transparency and strengthen accountability with respect to companies' climate transition plans.

So, if that's the case – why then do we need a vote on the sustainability report?

For one, companies and boards bear responsibility to shareholders for their sustainability performance in the same way as they do for their financial performance. A 'Say on Sustainability' vote would have the same effect as a 'Say on Pay' proposal — it would promote more accountability and greater transparency.

In the absence of a 'Say on Sustainability' proposal, shareholders are left with the option of signaling dissatisfaction with the sustainability strategy and performance by voting against the (re)election of directors or other agenda items deemed appropriate given the nature of the concern. This is the approach that we follow at Robeco to signal concerns on our priority sustainable investing topics – climate, biodiversity and human rights. But the 'appropriate' agenda item may differ according to each investor's policies, which often makes vote outcomes more difficult to interpret for companies.

Having a 'Say on Sustainability' proposal would ensure that investors are able to convey their views on the company's sustainability strategy to the board and management through a clear For or Against vote. It would bring more clarity to the oftentimes heated debates that engulf AGMs – something not only shareholders but also companies need.

Company Highlights

Autodesk Inc. - United States

Meeting date: 16 Jul 2024

 $\textbf{Proposal(s):} \ \textbf{Executive Compensation } \mathcal{E} \ \textbf{Proposals Regarding the Right to}$

Call Special Meetings.

Autodesk, Inc. provides 3D design, engineering, and entertainment technology solutions worldwide.

Autodesk's 2024 Annual General Meeting (AGM) was held on July 16. The shareholder meeting featured a number of routine management proposals, like the advisory vote on executive compensation, as well as a contested proposal regarding the right to call special meetings.

Regarding this year's Say-on-Pay proposal, we noted several concerns regarding the company's incentive structure. These include short performance periods of only one-year for 100% of the metrics comprising the long-term incentive plan (LTIP), 60% overlapping metrics between the annual bonus plan and the LTIP and insufficient disclosure of performance goals for both plans. As a result of the above concerns, we did not support the advisory vote on executive compensation.

Two other noteworthy agenda items included both a management and a shareholder proposal regarding the right to call special meetings. In the contested proposal management proposed an ownership threshold of 25% of voting power to request a special shareholders meeting. On the other hand, the shareholder proposal requested for an ownership threshold of only 15%. Generally, given the company's size and shareholder base, we believe a minimum ownership threshold for requesting a special meeting should be around 10-15%. This is sufficiently high to prevent abuse and waste of corporate resources by minority shareholders, but also incentivizes management to genuinely engage with shareholders. To avoid a situation where shareholders might not be afforded any special meeting rights if the shareholder proposal failed to receive requisite support, we decided to vote in favor of both proposals. Ultimately, both proposals were approved by shareholders, a clear signal from investors that a 15% threshold was preferred over 25%.

Lenovo Group Ltd. - Hong Kong

Meeting date: 18 Jul 2024

Proposal(s): Director Elections.

Lenovo Group Limited, an investment holding company, develops, manufactures, and markets technology products and services. It operates through Intelligent Devices Group, Infrastructure Solutions Group, and Solutions and Services Group segments.

On July 18, Lenovo Group held its 2024 Annual General Meeting (AGM), where shareholders had the opportunity to vote on several management-backed proposals, including the election of board directors, the appointment of the company's auditor, and the authority to issue and repurchase shares. After reviewing this year's meeting agenda, we decided to support the majority of the proposals. However, we held concerns regarding a few proposals related to the election of directors.

After reviewing the proposed board composition, we determined that it followed several good local governance practices, including a high overall level of independence, sufficient gender diversity, and appropriate independence levels on each of the key committees. Nevertheless, we voted against the election of two directors due to concerns related to their attendance records over the past year and their external commitments. We believe board members should have sufficient time to fulfill their responsibilities, and the board should continuously monitor each individual director's external commitments. Both directors held multiple roles at other companies, including chairman and executive roles. This, along with poor attendance record for one of the candidates, prompted concerns regarding their ability to dedicate the necessary time to effectively oversee the company's management.

Naspers Ltd - South Africa

Meeting date: 22 Aug 2024

Proposal(s): Election of Directors, Remuneration Implementation Report & Remuneration Policy vote.

Naspers Limited operates in the consumer internet industry in Africa, Asia, Europe, Latin America, North America.

The 2024 Annual General Meeting of Naspers was marked by controversial agenda items related to the company's remuneration implementation report and a newly proposed remuneration policy.

In recent years, the company has faced consistent opposition from free-float shareholders regarding its remuneration practices, mainly due to concerns regarding the level of disclosures and the discretionary nature of the awards they implemented to incentivize management to close the share price versus Net-Asset-Value (NAV) gap.

This year, the remuneration implementation report again faced scrutiny for several reasons. First of all, the company failed to adequately disclose the treatment of annual plan and Long-Term-Incentives (LTI) awards for the former CEO, who stepped down in September 2023. Additionally, the LTI structure continued to be questionable, featuring a single performance metric that vests for below median performance, and lacking disclosures around incentive limits and change of control provisions.

Regarding the newly proposed remuneration policy, two elements raised specific concerns. First, total pay and opportunity as the company intends to introduce a one-off "moonshot" award for the incoming CEO, which may lead to an award of up to US\$100 million, in addition to the ordinary grants, which have the potential to amount up to US\$54 million in FY2024/2025. Alongside significant quantum concerns, the company also proposed revoking share ownership requirements for the incoming CEO, referring to "the complicated tax dynamics" related to the incoming CEO's purchase of shares. Given the company's insufficient explanations and the ongoing concerns regarding incentive structures, we voted against both the implementation report and remuneration policy proposals. Due to our persistent concerns, we also voted against the Chair of the Compensation Committee for failing to implement acceptable remuneration practices.

Reliance Industries Ltd. - India

Meeting date: 29 Aug 2024

Proposal(s): Director Elections.

Reliance Industries Limited engages in hydrocarbon exploration and production, oil and chemicals, textile, retail, digital, material and composites, renewables, and financial services businesses worldwide.

Reliance Industries' Annual General Meeting (AGM) on August 29 offered an opportunity for us to communicate our concerns regarding the company's impact on climate change. As one of India's largest oil and gas exploration and production companies sits within Reliance's portfolio of subsidiaries, we expect the company to have the necessary strategies in place to address the risks its operations pose to climate change, and vice-versa. As we have found key climate strategy components, such as Scope 3 emissions targets, to be lacking, we have escalated our concerns to vote against the Chair of the Sustainability Committee.

Nike, Inc. - United States

Meeting date: 10 Sep 2024

Proposal(s): Shareholder Proposal Regarding Median Gender and Racial Pay Equity Report, Shareholder Proposal Regarding Report on Supply Chain Management, Shareholder Proposal Regarding Worker-Driven Social

Responsibility & Shareholder Proposal Regarding Report on Sustainability Targets and Strategy.

NIKE, Inc., together with its subsidiaries, designs, develops, markets, and sells athletic footwear, apparel, equipment, accessories, and services worldwide.

At Nike's 2024 AGM, shareholders voted on several key proposals, including the Say-on-Pay proposal and four management-opposed shareholder resolutions.

We opposed the Say-on-Pay proposal as the company's remuneration program fails to meet our minimum requirements related to pay structure. While we recognize the remuneration improvements rolled out in the past years, such as the increased ratio of performance-based restricted stock units (PSUs) and the move to year-long targets under the STI, we maintain significant concerns regarding the overreliance on one metric for LTI payouts and the integration of ESG in the incentive plan in the form of a qualitative component – rather than in the form of quantifiable, pre-set targets. Around 17% of the votes were cast against the proposal.

The first shareholder proposal requested that Nike "report on median gender and racial pay gaps across its workforce, where appropriate, addressing policy, reputational, and operational risks, as well as risks related to recruiting and retaining diverse talent." Although Nike has made strides in pay equity disclosure, particularly once adjusted for title and location, we believe that further transparency on median pay gaps is necessary to ensure progress and improve accountability. Therefore, we voted For the proposal, which received 26% investor support.

The second and third shareholder proposals focused on Nike's responsible supply chain practices. Both proposals were discussed during an investor group call in August, as part of our Fashion Transition engagement. Specifically, the second proposal requested that the company "issue a report assessing the effectiveness of its supply chain management in aligning with Nike's equity goals and human rights commitments," while the third proposal asked for a report evaluating how implementing worker-driven social responsibility principles would impact its human rights efforts. We believe that greater transparency on Nike's supply chain alignment with human rights and equity goals, along with additional reporting on plans to improve labor practices, would benefit shareholders. Thus, we supported both resolutions, which received 13% and 12% support from shareholders, respectively.

The fourth shareholder proposal requested that Nike report on its self-imposed sustainability targets and strategy, including how the company intends to meet its long-term environmental goals. Given the growing importance of climate and sustainability issues for both the company and its stakeholders, we saw merit in providing shareholders with detailed disclosures on Nike's sustainability progress and voted For the proposal. The resolution received 27% support from investors.

General Mills, Inc. - United States

Meeting date: 24 Sep 2024

Proposal(s): Shareholder Proposal Regarding Disclosure of Regenerative Agriculture Practices ଧ Shareholder Proposal Regarding Report on Plastic Packaging.

General Mills, Inc. manufactures and markets branded consumer foods worldwide. The company operates through four segments: North America Retail; International; Pet; and North America Foodservice.

The 2024 Annual General Meeting (AGM) of General Mills included several routine management proposals and two notable shareholder proposals. We supported all management proposals, highlighting our positive assessment of the company's overall governance. However, we opposed management recommendations on the shareholder proposals and voted in favor of both.

The first shareholder proposal requested for the company to disclose the reduction of pesticides achieved through the adoption of its regenerative agriculture practices. Conventional farming practices, including monocropping, tillage, and substantial synthetic pesticide and fertilizer use, have been shown to cause harm to the health of workers and nearby communities, soil fertility and retention, the climate, among others. Regenerative agriculture refers to a set of farming practices aimed at preserving topsoil and soil health while reducing impacts to humans and

the environment. The company has identified regenerative agriculture as an important component of its pesticide reduction strategy, but has not clearly disclosed the extent to which this practice has led or is expected to reduce pesticide use by its farming suppliers. Pesticide use reduction is one of the key goals of the Global Biodiversity Framework agreed at the UN Conference of Parties in Montreal in 2022. We determined that the additional disclosures requested by the shareholder proponent would lead to more transparency on this material issue, which led to our vote in favor.

The second shareholder proposal requested the company to issue a report assessing how it can increase the scale, pace, and rigor of its sustainable packing efforts. The proponent highlighted concerns regarding the company's current use of plastic packaging and reliance on end-consumers to return the packages to stores or local facilitators for recycling. Rather than reducing its plastic usage, the company has established a goal that 100% of its packaging will be recyclable by 2030. However, recent articles have shown that the current packaging designs and recycling strategies employed by the company are not entirely effective, and that plastic packages are being incinerated, landfilled or exported instead. This poses certain risks due to ongoing regulatory developments on single-use plastics and recycling labels, such as the UN Plastics Treaty. We believe that plastic pollution poses a systemic risk and that reliance on plastic packaging without implementing appropriate sustainable practices can cause financial harm to the company due to waste management costs and regulatory developments. For these reasons, we determined that the ask of the proposal was supportable and in the best interests of the company.

Proxy voting guidelines and approach

Robeco encourages good governance and sustainable corporate practices, which contribute to long-term shareholder value creation. Proxy voting is part of Robeco's Active Ownership approach. Robeco has adopted written procedures reasonably designed to ensure that we vote proxies in the best interests of our clients. The Robeco policy on corporate governance relies on the internationally accepted International Corporate Governance Network (ICGN) Global Governance Principles. The proxy voting policy is the standard policy for all Robeco investment funds. For discretionary mandates Robeco may implement a client's own proxy voting policy.

As a shareholder, Robeco is co-owner of many companies and has a right to vote on shareholder meetings for those companies. We use our voting rights with the aim to influence companies' corporate governance and other relevant investment related decisions in the best interest of our clients. In line with our commitments to clients, our aim is to support our investment thesis, promote better governance practices and encourage companies to adopt solid sustainability practices on material topics.

The Robeco voting policy consists of principles, guidance and example scenarios to assist in determining our voting instructions. Broadly, Robeco votes against management recommendations in case of poor corporate governance practices, when proposals are not in the best interests of long-term shareholders and on any other proposal that is out of line with our policy principles.
